

"How long have I been asleep?"




"Well then," said Toad,

#### What's this story about?

The children are playing a computer game called 'Red Planet' when the key begins to glow. The magic takes them to a spaceship which takes off and lands on a strange red planet.

#### Talk together

Read the title on the cover and talk about the picture. Ask, "Where do you think the children are?" Explain that Earth is a planet. Ask, "Do you know the names of any other planets?"

#### Read the story




- Look through the pictures to get an idea of what happens.
- Page 2, help the child to read the longer words, e.g. break 'pretended' down into syllables (pre-tend-ed) and show how 'spacemen' is a compound word, 'space' and 'men'.
- Page 9, ask, "Why wasn't Nadim worried about the rocket being safe?"
- Page 17, talk about why astronauts wear spacesuits (protection, e.g. from cold/radiation, and provides air to breathe).
- Page 21, ask, "Did it matter that the buggy was broken?"
- Page 27, ask, "What do you think Wilf's idea is?"
- At the end ask, "Who enjoyed the adventure?" "Why was that?" "Who didn't enjoy it?"

Floppy ran up. He wanted to get in the rocket ship with Wilf and Chip.


"Go away, Floppy," called Chip. "The rocket is going to take off!"




Nadim came to play. He had his computer with him, but he liked the look of the rocket ship. He wanted to play in it too.

"There's not room for all of us," said Chip. "Let's go inside and play with Nadim's computer."



"Come on," he called.


Chip didn't want to go inside. "It may not be safe," he said.

"Why not?" said Nadim. "This is a magic adventure."




They went inside the rocket. There was nobody there.

"Look at this computer," said Nadim. Floppy jumped up and put his paw on a button.




Five ... four ... three ... two ... one. The rocket began to take off. Up it went and out into space.

"Oh no!" said Chip. "I don't know where we're going."




They began to float about inside the rocket. Nadim found some boots. He put them on.

"We are going to land on that planet," said Nadim. "We will soon be there."




Nadim made the rocket land.

Floppy didn't like the look of it. He began to bark and bark.


"There are no trees," he thought.


"Do you think it will be safe outside?" asked Chip.

"I don't know," said Wilf.




They went out on the planet in the buggy. The buggy bumped over the rocks and the red dust flew up.


"I don't like this," thought Floppy. "I'm not made for space adventures."




Suddenly the ground cracked and a big hole opened up.

"Oh help," said Chip, Wilf, and Nadim as the buggy fell into the hole.






"I don't like this," thought Floppy. "I want to go home."



They all landed with a bump. The buggy landed with a crash and broke in two. They were inside a big cave.





"What a place!" said Wilf. "Look at it." Chip looked at the buggy.


"It's broken," he said. "It's had it!"

"Oh no!" said Nadim. "Look at them! I hope they like us."









Floppy's spacesuit began to fill with air. It got bigger and bigger. Then Floppy began to float.


"Get Floppy!" yelled Chip. "Don't let him float away!"




Wilf asked the creatures how to get out of the cave. They told him that there was no way out. They said that they had never been outside.

The spacesuit floated up out of the cave.


"We can float back to the rocket," said Chip. "What a good idea!"

"Good old Wilf!" said Nadim.


"I don't like floating," thought Floppy.




So Amelia Bedelia went into the kitchen.

"Now let's see what this list says."


Amelia Bedelia read,

at the list again.


"Draw the drapes?

Then she looked at the list.







Amelia Bedelia went right to work. Soon the chicken was finished.






Amelia Bedelia heard the door open.

asked Amelia Bedelia.




# Day of the Dinosaus



On the screen, Grandpa said, 'Come on, Clunk. We're going outside to collect some plants.'


The boys watched as Grandpa left the van. For a minute nothing happened, then suddenly there was a terrible noise from the Black Box.

'Alice and I will do that,' Rosie told her brother. 'You have to find Grandpa!'


While the girls made their plans to catch the dinosaur, Max followed Ben to the van.

Suddenly the boys heard a voice from a speaker at the front of the van: 'Hello, Ben.'




Max was very surprised. 'Who said that?' 'It's the van's computer,' Ben explained. 'We can just tell it where to go now.'

Ben looked at his friend. 'What about you, Max? Are you ready?'


'Not really,' Max answered.


'Now what?' asked Alice.

Rosie picked up a soccer ball. She gave a big smile. 'Hello, Mrs Brown!' she said.




'Watch this, Mrs Brown!' said Rosie. She started to kick the soccer ball up in the air, again and again.

Mrs Brown looked at her. 'Are you feeling OK, Rosie?'




### Chapter Five

'Great,' said Ben. 'Please take us to it, Van.'


The van began to drive. There were no roads,

### Chapter Six


Rosie and Alice were happy to see the van again. But then they saw that Grandpa wasn't with the boys.


'The van followed Grandpa's phone signal,' Ben explained. 'It took us to a T. Rex.'


Alice pointed at the garage door. 'It's in there,' she said. 'And it doesn't sound very happy.'

Max pulled the door open.


The little dinosaur was fast – probably fast enough to escape from two people, maybe three ... But four people were too many.

When they were close enough, something came out of the cave.


'Is that a dinosaur?' asked Alice.

'Let's go, Van!' shouted Ben.


Rosie asked Grandpa what had happened.

He would grow up to be a doctor, perhaps.


Then they would have Parmesan cheese for breakfast, lunch, and dinner.


But when they asked Matthew what he wanted to be, he said,

of King Mouse the Fourth, dressed like a general.


And next to it was a picture of cheese that made Matthew drool.


There were winged mice that floated through the air and mice with horns and bushy tails.

And mountains and rushing streams, and branches bowing in the wind. The world is all here, thought Matthew.










One looked like crusts of pastry, but when he looked more carefully, a mouse emerged.

But then, as if by magic, what Matthew saw began to change.


The shapes hugged each other and the pale colors of the messy junk heap brightened.


Even the crumpled newspapers now looked soft and smooth.

I want to be a painter!"










Then he married Nicoletta.
